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MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERS

During the 2020-2021 school year, with students and teachers adjusting to digital learning and many industries utilizing a hybrid work setting, STEP convened its partners and rapidly adapted to the needs of the local school systems and community colleges. Our organization shifted from in-person events to a virtual setting and allocated resources to activities with the highest beneficial impact on students. With this pivot, some of the data show a decline in overall participation and pathway enrollment.

Despite the challenges, partnerships increased and the year ended with a regional strategy session to examine workforce development trends and determine a regional focus for the future. STEP would like to recognize the hard work of our educators and local employers during the most trying time in recent history. 2600 Students Impacted #workHERE mini-grants were funded through the generosity of local industry partners and the ZSR Community Fund. The purpose of the #workHERE mini-grants is to test ideas, expand promising efforts or achieve greater impact through STEAM with a career/company focus and future pathway connection.

The #workHERE initiative is a regional effort to close the information gap by expanding career awareness within the Twin Counties through work-based learning experiences and creating seamless pathways that lead to employment.

Grants were awarded on a competitive basis to educators for worthy projects that show the promise of benefiting students and improving educational performance.

LEVERAGING RESOURCES

North Carolina Business Committee for Education provided over \$220,000 in combined funding to Edgecombe County Public Schools and Nash County Public Schools for implementation of student tech team-led Help Desks. Tech-savvy students are able to trouble shoot and solve technology problems with multiple devices. The teams alleviate some of the demands on the IT departments and support the virtual learning infrastructure.





FACILITATING COLLABORATION



NA 1 Residency Program

Nine recent Nash County Public Schools Nurse Aide I graduates participated in a Residency Program with UNC Nash Healthcare. The program allowed the graduates to gain 840 hours of Nurse Aide I work experience during the summer prior to entering college.



Pop Up Internet Cafes

Organized 22 free WiFi access locations for students throughout the Twin Counties.



STEM Lab at Carver Elementary School

Solicited funding from Suddenlink to support the STEM and Makerspace initiative at Carver Elementary School in Pinetops. STEM resources were purchased to create a community-based engineering design experience.



#workHERE Regional Strategy Session

80 educators, employers and community stakeholders brainstormed and strategized the imbalance in talent supply and demand.

STEP hosted a series of Virtual Lunch & Learns focused on local companies, careers and skills needed to earn a livable wage. The fall series included:


- Women in Engineering
